6. Competition and training venue

"Moraca" Sports Center is located in the new part of Podgorica, on the right bank of Moraca River, after which it got its name. The construction of this sports complex began in 1978 and various sport facilities are scattered across a five hectare area. The indoor facilities consist of:

- ✓ Large hall (capacity 4,200 seats)
- ✓ Training hall
- ✓ Combat sports hall
- ✓ Swimming pool
- ✓ Sauna
- \checkmark Table tennis hall
- ✓ Business facilities.
- The outdoor facilities include:
 - ✓ Open air swimming pool
 - ✓ Tennis courts
 - ✓ Basketball, volleyball and handball courts.



The large hall serves as the main indoor arena in Podgorica. It is best known as the home of the sport association "Budućnost" basketball, volleyball and handball teams. It hosted six preliminary-round games of Eurobasket 2005. For this occasion, the venue underwent major refurbishment to meet the standards imposed by FIBA.

Besides being a sports venue, it also hosts various concerts and happenings.

Trainings will be organized in two smaller halls at Sports Center Moraca.

7. Accommodation venue and catering

All delegations will be accommodated in student's dormitories of the University of Montenegro. The accommodation is about 2km from center of Podgorica and 1km from Sports Center Moraca.

Access to the accommodation centre will be possible only with an accreditation card.

The canteen, coffee shop and small shop will be situated at accommodation. Different types of meals (min 3) will be served including vegetarian ones.

8. Transportation

The delegations will be transferred from Podgorica Airport, Podgorica Buss and Railway station to the accommodation by the organizing committee according to the received travel schedules. For departure of the delegations, the same process will be followed.

OC will provide shuttle buses from accommodation venue to the sport venue and back. A schedule will be published.

9. Fees

Participation fee – 60 Euro per person per day Deposit per team to be paid before 15.04.2010

Each team has to pay 25% deposit of total cost (number of delegation X numbers of staying nights X 25%) 3 months before (15.04.2010) together with Quantitative entry form.

Montenegro is certainly one of the most interesting spots in the world. Even though it covers solely

around 14.000 km2 and it only has about 670.000 citizens, its contribution to the world cultural heritage is impressive comparing its size ... Montenegro is a southern European and a Mediterranean country. It is one of the most southern European states and it comes out on the south part of the Adriatic Sea. About 500km from Rome, 1.500 km from Paris, and Berlin, and about 2.000km west from Moscow, Montenegro lies on the Balkan Peninsula in the very heart of Europe.

PODGORICA

Podgorica, Capital of Montenegro

Podgorica became the capital of Montenegro in 1945. Not only are the Government and Parliament located here, but the town is also economic, cultural, social, educational, and sports centre with important faculties of the university and theatres. Many companies have located their headquarters in Podgorica. To fulfill all these demands it was

necessary to rebuild the town, which was completely destroyed in World War II, and very quickly. For many it happened too quickly. Almost nothing reminds one of the old Podgorica.

Podgorica was founded more than 2000 years ago. Even today one can still follow the footsteps of the Romans, who built the town of Doclea here. While Doclea served as the

headquarters for the Emperor of the Prevalis province, Byrziminium, just a few





revalis province, Byrziminium, just a few kilometers south, had more the character of a trading post.

During the 9th century immigrant Slavs came into power in the region. They founded the town and state of Duklja in the area of Byrziminiums. In their Golden Age they were ruling over the Zeta and Moraca valleys, the region around Lake Skadar and parts of the coast. The Turks turned Podgorica, which was its name since 1474, into a real fortress. They stayed until 1879. In 1946, after the creation of Yugoslavia, the town was named Titograd. In 1992 it got its

old name back, Podgorica, which literally means "under Gorica" (Gorica – the name of the hill that overlooks the centre of the city).

The modern sport in Podgorica starts its development during the last years nineteen century, as natural continuance of traditional games such as throwing weight, shooting and flying and standing jump. The very first competitions as well as the building sport's ground initiated development in a period when Montenegroprincipality. Since the time of establishing first sport organizations till now, sport in Podgorica gathers many young people. These organizations gave us the great number of talented individuals who represented Podgorica in Europe and worldwide. Soccer, basketball, volleyball, handball, karate and boxing honored Podgorica's sport here and aboard.

- 1st European University Karate Championship 2003.
- 12th Mediterranean Karate Championship 2003.

Podgorica was organizer and host for one qualification group of European Basketball Championship in 2005. At 2009 we have organized 6th European University Futsal Championship for man.

2. Technical regulations

The competition will be organized in accordiance with the most recent technical rules of the World Karate Federation (WKF).

Each country is autorised to enter a maximum of two (22) persons including seventeen (17) competitors (11men and 6 women) and five (5) officials.

Each country may enter in:

Kata:

- Individuals events: one (1) competitor
- Team events: theree (3) competitors

Kumite:

- Individuals events: one (1) competitor
- Team events:
 - a. Kumite male team is composed of maximum seven (7) competitors and a minimum five (5) competitors
 - b. Kumite female team is composed of maximum of four (4) and a minimum of three (3) competitors

At the first General Technical Meeting, the Head of Delegation or his representative shall confirm and sign the officials list of the competitors accredited by CISCA.

Countries participating in the competition with more than 5 (five) competitors must bring with their delegation and at their own costs one (1) World umpire WKF. These countries must provide the Organizing Committee three (3) month before Championship the names of two international referees (1 effective + 1 non-traveling substitute). Any country failing to fulfill this obligation will pay a fee (2 500€) to the Organizing Committee.

3. International Supervision, Control and Arbitration Committee (CISCA)

The Executive Committee of FISU should set up which shall consist of:

- The FISU delegate (s member of the EC who shall be a Chairman of the CISCA),
- The FISU delegate, member of the CIC, responsible for the International Control of the competitors,
- The Chairman of the Technical Committee of FISU,
- The delegate of the Medical Commission,
- The delegate of the FNSU
- The representative of the Organizing Committee

The CISCA shell meets as often as necessary during the event.

The CISCA shell be responsible for:

- The supervision and smooth running of the event,
- The interpretation of the FISU regulations,
- Settling any dispute which does not concerning any other committee or jury,
- Examining and dealing with any complains or protest of non technical nature,
- Taking emergency sanctions agonists teams and individuals who violate the regulations of the Championship,
- Deciding about other matters not covered in these regulations,
- Supervising of the organization of protocol ceremonies.

The Chairman of the CISCA, at least one day prior to the start of the Championship, shall convene a general meeting to which shell invite:

- The members of CISCA,
- Representatives of each competing country
- The CT members

The 1st general meeting shall elect an adequately representative and qualified Jury of Appeal in accordance with the regulations of FSI or as the meeting shell determine. The members of Jury of Appeal must be of different nationalities.

4. Technical Commission (CT)

The Technical Commission shall consist of:

- The Chairman, technical delegate of FISU; in case of equality vote, the chairman shall have a casting vote,
- The representative of FSI, in case of his absence the representative of FNSU of the organizing country,
- The technical representative of the Organizing Committee,
- The chairman of CMI,
- Three (3) experst from participating countries.

The CT appoints referees and judges for all the competitions from proposals made by Technical Commission of the Organizing Committee.

Prior to starts of competition, the CT Chairman is obliged:

- To maintain close cooperation with the CISCA Chairman and with an OC representative in CT,
- To ensure that the technical regulations of the appropriate FSI are observed,
- To inspect sport facilities and the equipment to be used during event,
- To gather exact information relating to:
 - The number and performance level of participating competitors and teams,
 - The number and qualification of the judges and referees from participating delegations.

- In agreement with CT members, he shall prepare the CT meeting with the representatives of participating countries as well as the proposals for:
 - The system of drawing a lots,
 - The appointment of Jury of Appeal,
 - The candidates for nominations o three (3) experts from participating countries for CT membership,
 - The system of appointments+ of judges and referees for each competition.

5. International Medical Commission (CMI)

The Executive Committee shall nominate a member of FISU Medical Committee if the regulations of the appropriate FSI require doping control. He shall be chairman of CMI composed of physicians designated by the Organizing Committee.

The CMI shall be responsible for the supervision of following tasks:

- Medical care of participants,
- Doping control,
- To advise the CISCA about all matters related to hygiene and catering.

6. Participation

Only the following may participate as competitors in a FISU sport event:

- Students who are currently officially registered as proceeding towards a degree or diploma at the university of similar institute whose status is recognized by the appropriate national academic authority of their country,
- Former students of the institutions mentioned above who have obtained their academic degree or diploma in the year preceding the event.

All competitors must satisfy the following conditions:

- Be a national of the country they represent,
- Be at least 17 and less than 28 years of age on January 1st, 2010

7. Individual dossier

The Individual dossier for each competitor to be presented to the CIC must be written either in Official working languages of FISU (French, English, Russian or Spanish) and stamped with a seal from the relevant FNSU.

The dossier must include:

- A passport of identity card which shall include:
- Full name (in capital),
- Nationality, date and place of birth,
- A recent photograph.
- If a student:

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- A document proving that he has satisfied the conditions normally required in his country for entrance to a university or similar institute,
- A FISU Eligibility Form stamped and signed by FNSU and University or similar institute or student card or certificate from the appropriate national academic authority certifying that the competitor is currently officially registered as proceeding towards a degree or diploma at university or similar institute whose status is recognized by the appropriate national academic authority of their country.
- If a former student:
 - Proof of the date he obtained his academic degree or diploma
- If a pupil
 - A certificate of study signed, by hand, by the responsible official of the establishment certifying the date of entry into that establishment and that the competitor has been regularly attending that establishment for at least two (2) years.

The CIC has the right to verify the validity of any document presented by any means of communication.

8. Participants Identity Cards

Numbered identity cards with a recently taken photograph will be issued to each competitor whose dossier has been approval by the CISCA. Identity cards will be issued also to all accredited officials, judges and referees.

Competitors will be required always to keep their cards with them and be prepared to present them for inspection by member of CISCA or any persons authorized by them.

Identity cards will admit the holders to sports venues, official accommodation and to any other facilities or services agreed between the Organizing Committee and the Executive Committee of FISU.

Heads of Delegation or his representative in declaring their starters or composition of teams must list also the identity cards or their competitors.

Competitors in reporting for the start of any individual sport and also for a team sport must be prepared to show their cards to the official in charge. For team championships, the Head of Delegations or his deputy, before each match, must present a list of the players who will be taking part which must include the number of the identity cards.
